Message from the Pastor . . .

"and they went out and fled from the tomb; for trembling and astonishment had come upon them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid" Mark 16:8(NRSV)

This scripture verse is by far one of my favorites. The reasons why it is one of my favorites is that I find it authentic, I find it stark, I find it hopeful, very human and full of mystery!

It's authenticity (beyond being the earliest recorded ending for Mark's gospel) lies in its stark ending, which is brilliant, because it leaves us wondering what happened to the women who visited the tomb, what happened to the gospel message? It leaves us hanging, intentionally. We know from our perspective 2000 years, hence, that the gospel message did get out. We are given some hints about how that may have happened because a few verses before this it says that the "young man" in the story tells them that they came looking for the "crucified one" but "he is not here, he has been raised". He then tells them that they are to go and tell the disciples, and Peter, "that he (the Risen One) is going before you to Galilee; there you will see him, as he told you." The gospel did spread in spite of these very human people and their very human fear. It is this dissemination of the message through human beings, like these women, who sometimes fail, that gives me hope. It does so because it means that God's purposes are not entirely dependent on me. There is some mystery about how God


works through us. There continues to be mystery in how people's lives are touched and healed and transformed by God through our relationship with each other. There continues to be mystery for me in how God gets the message of grace, love, compassion and inclusion to those who need to hear it, through people like you and me. But my hope shines even more when I realize that if God trusts people like you and me, even though we do have fear, even though we do not always follow through with what we are called to do, still God trusts us with this great good news!

So as we enter this Easter season I encourage you to nurture hope for our new Leadership Team as we learn together how to be church in a whole new manner. Nurture hope as we venture into new ministries, as we connect with our community of Portage in a way we never have before. Nurture hope as we become more and more invested in the gospel message of outreach, hospitality, stewardship and grace.

Finally I want to invite you to include in your hope, this special Easter opportunity for giving. This offering will provide us with funds to continue to meet our commitments to ministry beyond our own congregation, ministry that reaches around the world. HOLY THURSDAY, April 17, 2014

GOOD FRIDAY, April 18, 2014

I am happy to announce that the Bowling Green Ministerial Association has set the Good Friday Community Service on April 18, 2014. It will be called "A Good Friday Pilgrimage" and will feature four distinct worship experiences joined by processionals between the churches following the cross. Everyone is invited to come to any of the sections or all of them. This will enable those churches who have their own worship that day to also participate in at least one or two sections of the community event and give working persons the choice of day-time or evening. Persons who are unable to walk the distances are welcome to come to the service(s) only. The processionals will take place rain or shine, so participants may want to bring an umbrella.

(1) The Pilgrimage will begin at Noon at Trinity United Methodist Church 200 N. Summit St. where the congregations will join in the Proclamation of the Passion Story and The Ten Reproaches: Christ's Lament Against His Faithless Church. (2) around 12:45, those who are able, will walk from Trinity to First Presbyterian Church, 126 S. Church St, following the cross. (3) At 1:00 p.m. we will remember the Seven Last Words of Christ at 1st Presbyterian. Seven churches will present short pieces of scripture, prayer and music. (4) At @ 1:45, those who are able will follow the cross from the Presbyterian Church to St. Aloysius Catholic Church, 150 S. Enterprise. (5) At 2:00 p.m. we will observe the Stations of the Cross at St Aloysius. (6) When the service is over the procession will return to Trinity, where presumably people have parked their cars. (7) At 7:30 p.m. the procession will resume from Trinity to St Mark's Lutheran Church, 315 S. College Dr. This is a longer walk and it will be twilight. 
